

Sex and Gender




Spectrum of Sex



Sex is assigned at birth based on classifications like external anatomy, chromosomes and hormones. Sex does not determine a person's gender identity or sexual orientation.



Spectrum of Gender



Gender Identity: How gender is experienced by the inner self, determined by the individual.

Gender Expression: How gender can be (visually and socially) expressed/presented/communicated.

Intersecting Factors: The LGBTQ+ community encompasses a wide array of diverse identities, with each individual experiencing unique intersecting factors that shape their experiences. For instance, a person's sex assigned at birth or gender identity may intersect with their race, culture, religion, socioeconomic status, or disability, resulting in complex layers of privilege and discrimination.



Sexual Orientation

Sexual Orientation: the identity term or labels that describe someone's feelings of attraction related to gender



Pansexual: Sexual attraction to all genders (regardless of gender). Gender does not play a significant role in their attraction.

Omnisexual: Attraction to all genders. Gender can play a significant role in their attraction.

Polysexual: Attraction to many, but not all genders. Often occurs as an attraction to a binary gender and multiple non-binary gender identities.

Bisexual: Attraction to multiple genders (some, or all). Often described as attraction to the same/similar gender(s) and different genders.

Abrosexual: Sexuality is fluid, fluctuating across different orientations (some, or all).



Homosexual (Gay/Lesbian): Attraction is experienced to the same/similar gender (e.g. between men/men-aligned people and other men/men-aligned people).

Heterosexual (Straight): Attraction is experienced to a different gender to one's self.

Aceflux: Identity that continues to shift along/across the ace spectrum.

Demisexual: A strong emotional bond must occur before sexual attraction may be felt.

Greysexual: Rare and/or weak, and/or ambiguous, sexual attraction is experienced.

Asexual: Little to no sexual attraction is experienced to any gender.
